An evolving exhibition

Curated by David Walsh, Nicole Durling, Olivier Varenne, Adrian Spinks and the Mona team. Works come and go; others stay. The permanent collection continues, however we keep changing. (2010); Wim Delvoye, Cloaca Professional (2010); Brigita Ozolin, Kryptos (2008-2010).

Gilbert & George: The Art Exhibition

Gilbert & George: The Art Exhibition is a major retrospective, including pictures spanning five decades; dating from 1970 to most recent pictures of 2014. Curated by Gilbert & George and coordinated by Mona's Co-Directors of Exhibitions and Collections Olivier Varenne and Nicole Durling, the pictures are exhibited across the entirety of Mona's touring galleries, with three cinema spaces screening films and performances by Gilbert & George from throughout the decades.

Katthy Cavaliere: Loved

Sydney artist Katthy Cavaliere (1972 – 2012) had a lifelong project of packing, storing and transporting the wreckage of her personal possessions and transforming it into art. Featuring photographs, video and installations, Katthy Cavaliere: Loved at Mona traces thirteen years of key works by an artist who, having trained as a photographer, found form across many disciplines. Just as she embraced the typo in her birth name, Katthy considered the mistakes, accidents and emptiness of existence, 'reality's black tunnel of nothingness', as imaginary spaces capable of producing art. This retrospective provides an insight into a life lived in objects, where readymade things acquire an aura of love and trauma and comprise a portrait of the artist.

The exhibition will travel to Carriageworks in 2016.

Mathieu Briand Et In Libertalia Ego, Vol. II Until 11 July, 2016

Creating an artists' utopia on a near-deserted island is a fantasy for many. It is also the reality of an evolving seven-year art project, Et In Libertalia Ego by French artist Mathieu Briand, which explores isolated island communities, from Madagascar to Pitcairn Island. The ambitious project, which was initiated in 2008 on a small island off the coast of Madagascar continues years later, as Briand brings Et In Libertalia Ego Vol. II, to the Museum of Old and New Art (Mona).

Curated by Nicole Durling and Olivier Varenne, Et In Libertalia Ego, Vol. II expands upon the project's manifestation by introducing Pitcairn Island and its inhabitants into the fold, with videos, paintings, objects and sculptures, a dugout canoe, a sacred tree, and remnants of island life. Briand returns to the island off Madagascar in September 2015 as part of this iteration, and an artist's book will be published later this year.

ON SITE:

MONA LIBRARY – THROUGH THE TUNNEL TO THE ROUND HOUSE

More than 10,000 titles, so far, reflecting David Walsh's collecting habits and personal interests. Books on ancient cultures, modern and contemporary art, numismatics, and 'how to' guides to museum operations. Researchers welcome.

+ Open IOam to 5pm in winter, IOam – 6pm in summer. Closed Tuesdays and Christmas day. Covered by museum entry.

MONA SHOP

In the Courtyard House. Mona merchandise – cards, umbrellas, key rings. Books for adults and children including Monanisms – written by David Walsh and exhibition catalogues. Not your usual museum shop: jewellery modeled on internal organs; handmade corsets and tasteful adult toys. + Open 10am to 5pm. Closed Tuesdays and Christmas day. MUSEUM ROOF PLAZA

Flatbed Truck, Trailer and Cement Truck (2007) by Wim Delvoye Amarna (2015) by James Turrell (born 1946 in Los Angeles, USA)

Amarna is one of a series of more than 80 Skyspace installations Turrell has built in high altitude and geographically isolated locations. Mona's work is the largest Skyspace to date and Turrell's southernmost installation.

THE CHAPEL (2010-2011) by Wim Delvoye

Suitable for ceremonies and occasions of all persuasions.

Wim whimsy: 15 metre diameter, rusted corten steel, filigree lasercut pavilion with an eight-metre cupola rising over the heptagonal 'apse' featuring seven stained-glass windows - for each day of the week.

EAT + DRINK

THE VOID AND THE VOID BAR

The Void, the Museum's lowest floor, is located 14-metres below ground and was carved out of 240million-year-old Triassic-era sandstone. As well as various artworks, we've put a bar there – The Void Bar, so you can begin the process of losing reason, caution and inhibition before you enter the gallery. Sit in Victorian and Edwardian armchairs, drink rare spirits and ales or the usual Moo Brew beers and Moorilla wines, and snack on tasty treats.

+ Void Bar open I2pm with last drinks around 4pm. Closed Tuesdays and Christmas day. Included in museum entry.

MUSEUM CAFÉ

Part of the original 1957 Roy Grounds-designed Courtyard House – the entrance to the Museum of Old and New Art. Cake, coffee and other café-type things: pastries, sandwiches, soups etc. Alcohol too. Sit inside or out.

+ Open IOam to 5pm. Closed Tuesdays and Christmas day. Covered by museum entry.

MOORILLA WINERY

When Claudio Alcorso founded Moorilla in 1958, he was told it was a bad idea. It wasn't. We're now one of Tasmania's oldest contemporary wineries, celebrating our 50th vintage year in 2012. We produce two styles of wine here onsite: Muse for the old world, and Praxis for the new. One to cellar, and one to drink. Now.

Our winemaker is Canadian-born Conor van der Reest, and has been since 2007.

THE SOURCE RESTAURANT























The Source team, led by Philippe Leban (former sous chef to Guillaume Brahimi) creates contemporary French-inspired cuisine using fresh, seasonal produce.

CELLAR DOOR (opposite The Source Restaurant)

Start your wine tour here, or have a tasting. Buy Moorilla wines and Moo Brew beers.

+ Open 9.30am – 5pm, closed Tuesdays and Christmas day. \$A10 I hour tastings, or buy something and get your money back. Museum entry not necessary.

THE WINE BAR

The best of both worlds – Moorilla wine, Moo Brew beers and other craft wines, ales and spirits. Oysters, charcuterie, cheese, dessert; churrasco (Olé) and wood-fired pizzas in the summer. A deck with a nice view. Please do not feed the peacocks.

+ Open 10am until late, closed Tuesdays and Christmas day. Museum entry not necessary.

THE GOLDEN HOUR

Spend sunset with a stranger. Communal dining at Mona's Wine Bar. Soak up sunset courtesy of James Turrell's rooftop spectacular Amarna (2015), then retire for some top-notch tucker and flirty banter with the stranger on your left.

+ Open 6.45pm Wednesday and Thursday evening. Closed Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve. Musuem Entry not necessary. Set three-course menu \$79 (add \$50 for matched wines).

MOO BREW - off site tours

Established in 2005, Moo Brew produces five year-round beers with labels designed by Australian artist, John Kelly: Pilsner, Pale Ale, Hefeweizen, Belgo and Dark Ale, as well as a once yearly specialrelease stout.

Each has an original painting by its namesake. There are also antiquities and a collection of ancient coins.

ROY, ROBIN, ESMOND AND WALTER (the architects)

Iconic designer furniture and original artworks.

Designed by Nonda Katsalidis in association with the Antarctica Group.
